About the NSW Start Strong Pathways Program

The Start Strong Pathways program is a NSW Government initiative designed to support the early learning needs of children aged 0–3 years, particularly those not yet eligible for preschool. Launched in 2018 and continuing through 2025, the program provides funding to not-for-profit services to deliver place-based, culturally appropriate early learning activities to children and families. Its core objectives are to engage very young children in early education, support their transition into preschool settings, and promote the value of early childhood education to families and communities.

The program is especially focused on reaching children from priority groups, including Aboriginal families, children with disability or developmental concerns, those from low-income or culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, and families experiencing social isolation. Services funded under the program offer tailored support such as play-based learning, parent education, and transition planning.

Evidence supporting the program highlights the long-term benefits of early engagement in education. Research shows that children who participate in early learning before preschool are more likely to develop strong social, emotional, and cognitive skills, which are critical for school readiness. The program also helps families navigate the early childhood education system, improving access and inclusion for those who may face barriers.











Our Playgroup NSW PlayStrong Program

Playgroup NSW delivers the Start Strong Pathways initiative through its PlayStrong supported playgroup model. We know that these playgroups are a powerful way to deliver quality outcomes for children and families because:

- Children who attend playgroups are 47% more likely to be developmentally on track across all five AEDC domains and these outcomes hold true across diverse population groups
- Playgroups are particularly effective in addressing vulnerabilities in social competence, emotional regulation, and language exposure - domains that saw the largest increases in vulnerability based on AEDC data between 2021 and 2024.
- The model is informed by the Early years Learning Framework
- The playgroups reduce attendance barriers for families with no cost to attend and locations that are readily accessible.
- Families are empowered through access to information, resources and community connection for support and services
- The Peep Learning Together program is embedded in the playgroups
- They are uniquely connected to, and embedded within, local communities and collaborate with local services including libraries, community services, health and allied health, early childhood partners.
