Playgroup NSW Launches the Playgroup Collective at NSW Parliament House

Sector leaders, advocates, and community representatives came together at NSW Parliament House on Thursday 16 October to celebrate the official launch of *The Playgroup Collective* — a powerful new alliance aimed at strengthening outcomes for children, families, and communities across New South Wales.

The event brought together passionate voices from across the early childhood and community sectors, united by a shared commitment to ensuring playgroups remain accessible, supported, and recognised as vital foundations in the early years.

Playgroup NSW was honoured to welcome The Hon. Natasha Maclaren-Jones MLC, Shadow Minister for Families and Communities, Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, Disability Inclusion, Homelessness, and Youth, and The Hon. Sarah Mitchell MLC, Shadow Minister for Education and Early Learning. Both Ministers reaffirmed their strong support for playgroups and the crucial role they play in building connected, resilient communities.

"Playgroups are more than just a place to play — they are safe, welcoming, and inclusive spaces where children build early connections and families find community, support, and belonging," said Playgroup NSW CEO Emily Caska. "The Playgroup Collective represents a significant step forward in amplifying the impact and advocacy of the playgroup sector."

Throughout the launch, attendees discussed the unique value of playgroups as community-embedded, evidence-based programs that contribute to a stronger, more connected future — particularly within the context of the Early Years Strategy and Thriving Kids Initiative.

Key themes emerging from the discussion included:

- The importance of a unified playgroup sector to strengthen advocacy, access, and quality.
- The need for greater recognition and support for volunteers and the workforce through training, mentoring, and shared learning.
- The role of advocacy in raising awareness, showcasing best practice, and supporting conversations with government on long-term sustainable funding.
- The value of collaboration and partnerships in responding to community needs, sharing data, and building on collective strengths.

Playgroup NSW will consolidate insights from the day to inform action items for The Playgroup Collective and share outcomes publicly in coming weeks, with meetings to follow with government.

"This launch marks an important milestone in shaping the future of playgroups in NSW," Ms Caska said. "We're deeply grateful for the support shown today and infectious energy and passion to ensure

that every child thrives in the first 2,000 days and look forward to working together to strengthen playgroup access and impact across NSW."
